Millions of people in the U.S. contract sexually transmitted infections (STIs) each year. In fact, the CDC reports that in 2014, a staggering 2.86 million new cases of chlamydia and 820,000 cases of gonorrhea were reported.

Many of these cases occurred in teenagers or young adults. In addition, thousands of people have chlamydia or gonorrhea and don't know it. If these diseases go untreated, a woman can get pelvic inflammatory disease (PID). This is an infection in a woman's reproductive organs that can become serious.
